"What did you say?"

No matter where you work, irrespective of your designation, whatever your job description, you will be called upon daily to communicate. As toastmasters, we pride ourselves on doing this well - but do we? Here are 3 pitfalls I believe we encounter in both our "prepared" and our "impromptu" communication.

1. USING JARGON

A highly qualified, extremely competent and articulate young IT professional finished a 30 minute presentation and then asked the Board of Directors "Do you have any questions?" After a brief pause, one of the directors said "How can we question, when we didn't understand it?" You may laugh at the director but, as one of the finalists at the World Championship of Public Speaking said, "it is not her responsibility to understand you – it is your responsibility to make yourself understood". The mark of a true master is the ability to communicate in language that can be understood. This is especially true if it is a technical subject. The Toastmasters CC manual has a whole level on working with words, and the need to avoid jargon, but how many of us actually use this when doing our board or other presentations? If you are unable to present your case except by using jargon, then maybe you haven't really understood the material at all!

Try finding different non-technical words to explain the concept or use examples to highlight the point. For instance, instead of saying "A meeting is not properly constituted unless a quorum is present" say "Unless we have the minimum number of people needed, the meeting won't be valid". Instead of "If our firewall is penetrated we get incident reports" say "if someone tries to break into or hack into our computer systems, the system sends our IT staff messages." Or explain cloud computing by comparing it to a large warehouse where several people can store documents in different sections of the building instead of each having to build their own warehouse.

And remember, "jargon" does not only mean technical words, it can also mean initials and abbreviations which your listeners may not know. For instance, do you know when people in the leisure industry speak of MICE for hotels, they are not referring to rats?!

2. NOT LISTENING

It's been said that when the other person is speaking we are not really listening, just busy preparing our own response! This becomes painfully evident at meetings, when a director asks a management officer a question based on his presentation and the officer's answer is not a response to the question but a continuation of the argument or justification he made in his paper If the other person in your conversation feels you are not respecting him or her enough to listen and answer appropriately, he or she will be less willing to accept whatever you are trying to communicate.



Properly hearing a question or comment /response, gives you a good idea of how the other person feels about the topic about which you are speaking. It will give you clues as to how positive or negative they are towards your proposal, and that is extremely valuable in how you continue to take the conversation forward. Don't miss out on that chance by not actively listening!

Round Robin sessions, using the word of the day correctly and understanding the table topic give us an indication of how good we are at listening. How high do you score at listening?

Try finding different non-technical words to explain the concept or use examples to highlight the point.

3. SPEAKING IN CONFUSING, RAMBLING SENTENCES

If you are nervous, or extremely passionate about what you are speaking of, you could go on and on without a pause to allow listeners to digest what they hear. Such speakers can also bring out long sentences joined together with "however", "therefore" or even "and so" The second and third CC projects both provide guidelines on how to structure one's speech and how to get to the point. These are very valuable for communication whether it is a 3 minute response to a question or a 10 minute presentation on a new proposal. Remember, listeners don't have the luxury of "going back and reading it once more". They have to hear and absorb it as you are speaking- so be kind! Make it easy for them to understand what you are saying by having a brief introduction, a logical flow, a connection between your points and a summary at the end.

Despite the temptation, don't try to push everything you know about the topic into the 3 minute slot you've been given. Say enough to show your listeners the benefits of what you are proposing (or risks or dangers you wish to warm them about) and indicate that you can tell them more if they are interested. This will help you to keep it crisp and clear and also allow your listeners to grasp the point better.

With social media exploding, and bringing in its own new language of emoticons and abbreviations, it is easy to think that communication is different now than before. Here's what Steve Burnett, founder of a boutique market communication company says: "Regardless of the changes in technology, the market for well-crafted messages will always have an audience."

I agree - do you?

How to influence your boss

It's our duty to take Toastmasters principles to an arena bigger than the comfort of our cozy meeting rooms as Toastmasters we are constantly encouraged to forge a path of personal growth. Real personal growth happens when we can become successful in our lives outside of Toastmasters. This contributes to strengthening the Toastmasters brand to non-Toastmasters and influencers (e.g. your boss) who have not been touched by the brand whether you work in a commercial enterprise or an entrepreneurial start up.

As a leader you have an opportunity to influence three types of People:

- 1. People above you in your hierarchy/authority- (a.k.a your boss!)
- 2. People below your hierarchy/authority
- 3. People on par with you in terms of hierarchy and authority.

The above 3 items are extensively discussed in John Maxwell's best seller 'The 360 Degree Leader'. Due to space limitations, this article will concentrate only on item number 1, wherein I will discuss some principles and tips useful to our leaders in the middle of an organisation.

The middle of any organisation is crucial since this is where about 90% of all leadership occurs. A less performing middle or a slacking middle in any organisation can put undue pressure on the man at the top. A Toastmasters club is no different. When you are a 360 degree leader you can lead from anywhere in the organisation. Most importantly your boss needs your insight, input and influence for him to perform better. If you are to be taken seriously by your boss you need to demonstrate certain attributes.

A few of them are below:

1. Lead yourself exceptionally well

This is the starting point of all influencing. If you don't follow yourself- why would anyone else? If you are someone that a task can be delegated to without strict supervision, your boss will love to have you in his team. Nothing will make a positive impression on your leader as strong as this. Your suggestions and ideas will be readily accepted by the leadership.

2. Lighten your leader's load.

Passing the buck is easy, but lightening the boss's load by playing your part is tough but rewarding in the long run. When the boss succeeds, your organisation succeeds and eventually you succeed. By doing your part exceedingly well you are able to influence the leadership as well as earn credibility for long term career success.



3. Do more than Manage - Lead

Managers work with processes and procedures, but leaders work with people by inspiring them. Managers will think mostly about moment to moment activities, leaders have to keep a long term perspective in mind as their decisions have long term consequences on people and the organisation. If you are currently a manager, re-engineer yourself as a leader and look at your work through the leadership window, things will begin to change for you.

When the majority of your peers and other staff consider you as a leader because of your conduct, you will gain respect and impact with your own leader (boss).

4. Invest in relationships.

Forging and maintaining relationships plays a big role in career success. Maintaining a good relationship with your peers will certainly assist you when you need their assistance. More importantly, the relationship you share with your boss will determine if your employment is one of enjoyment or a total nightmare!

If you want to connect with your boss you must take the lead. You will build relational equity in the long run. If you want to have a very good relationship you must earn the trust of your boss by building relational currency. If you do things that add to the relationship you increase the change in the pocket. If you consistently drop the ball, you harm the relationship and will eventually bankrupt the relationship.

5. Be prepared every time you take your leaders time.

We must all appreciate that our boss's time is valuable as many matters call for his attention of varying degrees of significance.

If you intend obtaining approval for a project from your boss always be well prepared. The more preparation you do, the chances are that you will be successful in convincing him.

If you are taking his time, always be ready to bring something to the table through your ideas, research, tech knowledge or reading. Do not at any cost expect your boss to think for you, be proactive and be ready to provide your own suggestions.

If you have a reputation as someone who has ideas and a knowledge of a wide range of activities, you may be the boss's go to person.

Our Toastmasters Program provides ample opportunities through the leadership and communication tracks to practice some of the above attributes to become an influencer who can lead in any situation and position. One of the most important skills you can acquire is the ability to influence your boss. If you are successful in this aspect you are certainly on your way to career success!

Officer Training Programme An Outsider's Perspective

As a recent import to the island, and coming from an educational/training background, it becomes virtually impossible for me to avoid making relative comparisons about the structural content, the mode of delivery and, to a certain extent, the desired objectives of any locally organised training programmes that I get to participate in. And that's exactly what I found myself doing at the Officer Training Programme held at the Dialog Head office on Sunday 13th August 2017. What could I have expected from that morning's edification?

Would it be the usual regurgitated pattern of each presenter putting up slide after slide and reading out aloud the accompanying text? Would the Powerpoint presentations even work when needed? How much of the morning would devote itself to trivial irrelevant matters and logistical problems? These were the kind of irritating questions I found myself chewing over as I took an early morning shower, had a cup of strong coffee with two cigarettes, got dressed and began to head towards Union place on that beautiful Sunday morning.

Breakfast was the first event on the agenda and all I could think about in the elevator up to the canteen was a refreshing cup of tea. For a nation which is considered to be the largest producer of this wonderful beverage, it would be justifiably difficult to imagine how the facilitation of a 'cuppa' could pose any sort of serious challenge. Alas, that particular avenue of personal pleasure was quickly sealed off as the inevitable cold, little green carton reared its ugly head in front of me once more. Yet again I found myself face to face with the dreaded 'Milo'. It seems that the tradition of serving tea is being hastily relegated to the bowels of Toastmasters history in a majority of the social events. Maybe, I pondered, TM has a contract with them. Maybe, I even dreaded, that this new fad is what the younger generation aspire to. Maybe, horrific as it sounds, tea has now gone out of fashion? The venue itself, however, quickly made up for the absence of the tea. It was simply superb; an extraordinarily large auditorium with plush seating, dramatic lighting and a crystal clear state of the art sound system.

The Youth Leadership initiative, presented by DTM Mahesh Jayasinghe was absolutely inspiring once all fifteen of the technicians began to frantically twiddle around with the technicalities for about 20 minutes. Mahesh, at one point decided to give up on using the presentation slides altogether and instead, revert to the time-tested method of vocal-only presentation. For a presentation that, for me, carried a very strong message through the power of the images projected, this would have had very little, if any, purpose. Personally, I felt that this information should have gone out to a much broader audience and not just the Exco members of clubs.



TM Niranjan De Silva injected lashings of humorous wit at just the right time. As pretentious as it sounds, I find a lot of the local humorous speakers lacking one essential ingredient – humour! I'm not a big fan of slapstick and the right combination of dry wit laced with a touch of sarcasm is indeed a very rare commodity. This man, however, seems to have no trouble making me laugh. The more I see of TM Niranjan De Silva, the more I seem to like him.

TM Hingston Lovell, however, somehow managed to concoct a more 'hands-on' approach in an effort to provoke giggling and tittering from the audience with a 'shout the loudest' contest. It just goes to show that humour is not as complicated as we tend to think it is. Simplicity is sophistication and I thought that many a lesson could be learnt from Hingston's approach. The frolicking eventually came to a conclusion with the announcement of the 'breakout' into the appropriate officer training groups.

This 'breakout', however, could more accurately be described as a complete 'breakdown' as confusion began to run rampantly through the auditorium. It seems that nobody had even thought about 'staggering' the exits from the auditorium to respective training rooms. With around 150 people trying to get into 3 lifts in a small corridor whilst being requested to stay within sight of their allocated guides, the inevitable consequence had to be chaos. And, simply put, chaos is exactly what ensued.

I'm not too sure about what happened to the others but once the VPPRs eventually found their allocated room, however, they were treated to DTM Trishma Pinto, which, for me, was the highlight of the day. Trishma is unique – she knows exactly what she is doing, she knows how to get the message across and, she does it with an air of poised composure. A style that is clear, confident and does not leave much room for doubts to creep in. After gaining a much clearer insight into the functions of a VPPR, I managed to find my own way back to the main auditorium to witness a touch of professionalism via a closing Q & A session.

One can immediately sense the huge amount of time, work and effort that went into the preparation of this event. The organizers need to be congratulated for bringing about radical changes to the stale norms of the past. With just a little more attention to the logistical aspects and broader support given to the presenters, I think Division A is poised to take an adventurous major leap into the future.

I have to admit that I thoroughly enjoyed the day, met a lot of friends and certainly gained a lot of confidence in my EXCO role.






